## Contributions to the Community

A teacher does not simply go to work and teach content material. He/she preps the minds of young students so that they may be successful in life, not just their school courses. By bringing in the school board and district leaders, the students were motivated to do their best work and the school and district were also given a chance to monitor classroom success as well as have great options for their new logo.

Being able to incorporate the students in real world problems involving their own community and school districts will help them gain critical thinking skills and also help the community by getting valuable feedback and ideas from young, fresh thinkers; the students.

Had we been there longer, we would have taken this project one step further and had the students manufacture t-shirts with the winning logo (calculating cost, ROI, sales, etc.). Selling t-shirts would help raise money for the school and involve the community further strengthening the bond between school, districts, and the community.

Readying students for real world situations will help the community graduate strong, college/work-ready individuals. Many students are not given enough credit for their ability, and providing them the opportunity to stretch their minds will give them confidence in the world that lies ahead.
